Dr Crane arrives on site!

Congratulations to six-year-old Leticia Salas who trounced more than 300 contestants to win Mater's 'Name the Crane' competition at Springfield.

The Good Shepherd Catholic Primary School student chose Dr Crane for the 50-metre-high crane on the construction site of the new Mater hospital on Heath Care Drive.

"The reason why I named it Dr Crane is because doctors help people – and the crane is helping build the hospital that will help people," Leticia said.

Dr Crane is supporting John Holland Queensland workers in the construction of Mater Private Hospital Springfield Stage 2 – a major expansion of Mater's existing hospital that will provide an extra 174 public beds for the community. A second crane at the new hospital has been named Galu — an Indigenous name for a crane bird — following a separate competition for nearby Aveo residents and Mater staff. The winning suggestion was made by hospital staff members Shiny John and Nadia Wilson.

Mater extends a heartfelt thank you to all contestants who participated in the community-focused competitions.

Mater Hospital Springfield is being built through a partnership between the State Government and Mater.

Springfield's new hospital starts to take shape

Greater Springfield's new hospital on Health Care Drive is starting to take shape with the facility's foundation laid and the framework for two floors completed.

For the first time, people living in the area will have a dedicated hospital for their community, including an Emergency Department, an Intensive Care Unit and maternity services to meet the demands of growing families in the region.

Enabling works including relocating Mater Private Hospital Springfield car park,

Ambulance Bay and loading dock were completed last year in preparation for construction of the new hospital.

Work to date includes installation of underground utility services, and the commencement of the main structure.

The construction of the external structure is expected to be complete by 2025 with the internal fit out commencing mid 2024.

Mater Hospital Springfield will deliver an additional 174 public beds and is set to open in 2026.

Students enrolled in Mater Education's first Diploma of Nursing program in Springfield will qualify as Enrolled Nurses in 2025 – and with zero student debt.

Revolution in hysterectomy surgery comes to Springfield

A new hysterectomy procedure that leaves no scars and causes little pain has been performed at Mater Private Hospital Springfield for the first time.

The minimally invasive surgery, performed by Mater gynaecologist Dr James McLaren, eliminates the need for surgical incisions in the patient's abdomen.

Patient Kylie Godfrey, 49, of Logan Village, said her life changed dramatically after the Vaginal Natural Orifice Transluminal Endoscopic Surgery (vNOTES) and she was "up and about straight after surgery, and home the next day".

Dr McLaren studied the technique while working at London's King's College Hospital and is one of only a handful of Queensland surgeons qualified to perform the procedure.

Compared with an abdominal hysterectomy procedure, where recovery can take up to six weeks, vNOTES provide benefits such as reduced operating times, faster recovery, less postoperative pain and decreased blood loss.

vNOTES hysterectomies can be performed for a number of conditions such as uterine fibroids, prolapse of the uterus, pelvic pain, abnormal or heavy menstrual bleeding, and painful periods.
