Future healthcare workers flock to Mater expo

More than 700 job seekers and career changers attended Mater's Careers Expo last month to learn about work opportunities at the new Mater Hospital Springfield, set to open from April 2026.

From nursing and midwifery roles to administration and food services positions, the event provided people with a chance to explore the wide variety of jobs on offer as Mater prepares to open the new hospital.

Mater Hospital Springfield General Manager, Suzanne Hawksley, said the new hospital would create a healthcare precinct for both public and private patients in the heart of Springfield.

"It will be an incredible milestone for our community," Ms Hawksley said.

"Once fully operational, the facility will increase local employment by more than eight per cent and deliver new healthcare services to the Greater Springfield community for the first time.

"There will be an Emergency Department, Mater Mothers' maternity services, paediatric care and more." Up to 1,000 job opportunities are available at Mater Hospital Springfield.

Celebrating a decade of care in Springfield

Forest Lake's Brett Deaves was the first inpatient at Mater Private Hospital Springfield when the facility opened its doors 10 years ago.

Admitted for minimally-invasive surgery to remove bilateral kidney stones, Mr Deaves was treated by Mater Urologist Dr Stuart Philip.

Mr Deaves and Dr Philip recently reunited to help celebrate Mater Private Hospital Springfield's 10-year anniversary.

"We both look 10 years older – and in my case, a lot greyer!" Dr Philip said. "My main memory of the hospital opening was how keen and excited the team were to get started.

"So much planning and preparation went into those first few weeks, and it was great to see such a smooth start to the opening of a new hospital."

Mr Deaves said it was a 'real honour' to be the first inpatient.

"I had excellent treatment and care and it's exciting to know that Mater is expanding once again in Springfield," he said. "It's crazy to reflect on how far the entire region has come over the past 10 years.

Dr Philip said he has now completed thousands of procedures and surgeries at Mater Private Hospital Springfield and is looking forward to seeing healthcare services continue to expand in the community.

"Greater Springfield has gone from strength to strength over the past decade. When my family initially built a house here, things like a shopping centre, hospital, train line and AFL stadium were all just dreams," he said.

"There's an incredible group of very dedicated local GPs and allied health professionals, but we now also have multiple radiology providers and, of course, a new public hospital that will open very soon."

Mater Private Hospital Springfield employs 320 staff and has performed almost 75,000 procedures in the past decade.



Clinical trials to launch in Springfield next year

A clinical trials service will be embedded in the new Mater Hospital Springfield to provide Greater Springfield patients with additional or alternative treatments.

Yamanto grandmother Jan Mundt said participating in a Mater clinical trial has given her the chance to watch her grandchildren grow.

Diagnosed in 2018 with stage 4 metastatic lung cancer and given less than a year to live, Ms Mundt was offered a place on a clinical trial at South Brisbane - but says the opportunity to access trials close to home would be a gamechanger.

"My initial goal when starting the clinical trial was to see my grandson, then aged two months, start primary school," she said.

"Not only did I walk him into school on his first day, but I've also seen the arrival of my second grandson, Thomas, now aged four."


Grand finalist kicking goals off the field

First Springfield babies around the corner

Mater Mothers' Springfield will start delivering babies from May next year – and the first mums are already attending their antenatal clinics at Mater Health Hub, Springfield.

The new hospital will provide Springfield families with access to Australia's leading Mater Mothers' maternity services, with 1,700 babies expected to be delivered at the facility annually.

Mater Hospital Springfield's Assistant Director Clinical Services for Maternity and Paediatrics, Ali Broderick, said there would be a 16-bed maternity ward, 6 birthing suites and a 16-cot Neonatal Critical Care Unit (NCCU) to deliver world-class, contemporary care to mothers, babies and families when the new facility was fully operational.

"Our first Mater Mothers' patients are now able to access their antenatal care close to home ahead of our first births in May next year," Ms Broderick said.

"Referrals are now open for families who wish to have their babies in Springfield, and we are excited to say we have already had a lot of referrals come through for our first patients!"

Mater Mothers' Springfield will also include a Pregnancy Assessment
Centre – a dedicated 24/7 emergency care unit for women who experience difficulties during their pregnancies.

Springfield mother Jess Cragg said having maternity and paediatric services close to home would provide peace of mind for local families.

"My first daughter Issy (5) was born prematurely, so we still travel into Brisbane for specialist appointments regularly – having access to local maternity and paediatric healthcare will be a gamechanger," Ms Cragg said.

Prancer's pastry parcels

Serves: 6
Preparation: 25 minutes
Cooking: 60 minutes

Ingredients:

- 4 whole beetroot, sliced into wedges
- 200g baby leaf spinach, washed
- 200g feta or goats cheese, crumbled
- 1 brown onion, diced
- 2 tbsp dried cranberries
- Filo pastry
- 1 egg, beaten
- Rosemary sprigs, for garnish

Method:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C.
- Spread the beetroot wedges out in a baking dish drizzle with olive oil and salt, and roast in the oven, tossing occasionally, until soft.
- 3. Add the onion to a pan and fry until translucent. Add the spinach to this and cook for a further two or three minutes until wilted drain any excess liquid following this.
- 4. In a large bowl, mix the beetroot, spinach, onion, cheese and cranberries. Season to your liking.
- 5. Slice your filo pastry into 20cm squares and distribute your filling evenly among them. Fold the corners over to meet in the middle and cover the filling, pressing firmly to seal. Grease a muffin tin to hold the parcels' shape as they bake.
- 6. Brush each with beaten egg and bake until golden brown.

Serving suggestion:

Sprinkle with poppy seeds prior to baking – then to serve, add flaky sea salt and sprigs of rosemary.
