## Simply tops

Mater welcomed Springfield City Group leaders to celebrate the site's, 'topping out' of Mater Hospital Springfield, a significant construction milestone for the exciting project.

A topping out ceremony, originally a Scandinavian tradition, involves a tree being hoisted to the tallest point of a construction site once the highest beams or slabs are in place.

Mater Hospital Springfield General Manager Suzanne Hawksley recognised the significance of the feat, as the public hospital edges closer to completion with first patients expected by early 2026.

"We're on track to offer expanded healthcare services to Brisbane's western corridor from early next year," Ms Hawksley said.

"We are tripling our healthcare capacity locally, bringing more essential services closer to home."

The frame for the nine-story facility is now waterproofed complete, and the fit-out is well underway on the lower floors.

Springfield City Group Chief Executive Officer Raynuha Sinnathamby attended the topping out ceremony and said the project would support growth in the region.

"We are a community driven by health, education and innovation, and are proud to partner with Mater in prioritising this for our region," Ms Sinnathamby said.

"It's exciting to know our residents will soon have access to emergency, maternity and paediatric care closer to home, without the need to travel to Ipswich or Brisbane for care."

#### West Moreton locals tripled their impact

Greater Springfield residents dug deep for the recent Mater Giving Day, a 24-hour fundraising window where all donations to Mater Foundation are tripled.

A total of more than \$2 million was raised statewide to fund new medical equipment, technology and frontline staff.

Mater Private Hospital Springfield General Manager Suzanne Hawksley said equipment funded by community supporters made a major difference to healthcare in Brisbane's western corridor.

"Medical technology is constantly evolving and it's so important for our patients that we can bring that technology into our operating theatres and wards," Ms Hawksley said.

Recent technology funded by community support to Mater

Foundation and set to improve healthcare in Greater Springfield include:

- The Springfield Healthy Hearts living lab for global heart disease action
- Scalp cooling caps for chemotherapy patients
- A Sonosite, the latest technology allowing for improved accuracy for intravenous cannulation.

Funds raised from this year's event will be used to purchase equipment such as new patient beds to support reduced falls risks and improve patient comfort, and a Myosure console.

"The Myosure console will be used to support women suffering from abnormal bleeding symptoms caused by polyps or fibroids, by offering an effective treatment option that doesn't require major surgery," Ms Hawksley said.

## Springfield's first homegrown nurses graduate

Mater Education's first cohort of Diploma of Nursing students graduated in Springfield debt-free, thanks to Mater Education's partnership with the State Government to deliver fee-free nursing courses.

Sixty-six new hospital-trained enrolled nurses have now qualified from Mater Health Hub, Springfield, ready to boost the healthcare frontline without the burden of tuition debt.

The graduates were some of the first to train at Mater's state-of-the-art Hub, each saving nearly \$25,000 in fees to kickstart their dream nursing careers.



Among the graduates was 43-yearold Samantha Adams who wouldn't have been able to afford to study without the fee-free initiative.

Now the former medical research worker plans to find employment as an Enrolled Nurse and continue her studies with a Bachelor of Nursing at university to qualify as a Registered Nurse.

### Premier visits Mater Hospital Springfield

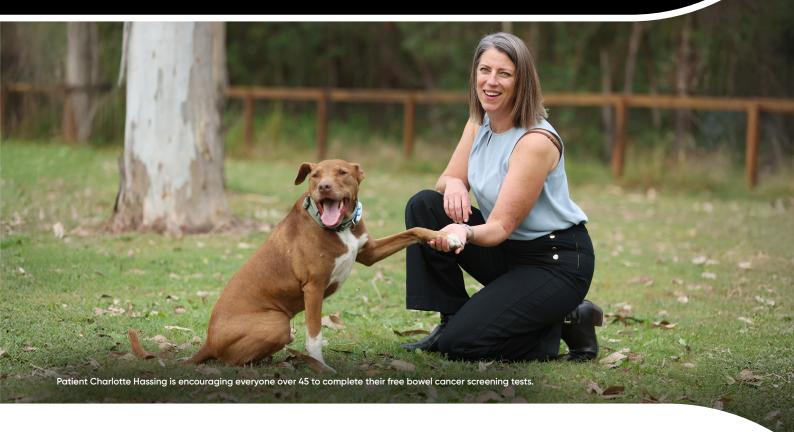
Queensland Premier David Crisafulli met Springfield nurses during a recent visit to Mater Hospital Springfield where he announced State Government support for the delivery of critical healthcare services in the region.

The Premier announced \$638 million in operational costs for the facility over the next four years.

Treasurer David Janetzki said the funding would equip Mater Hospital Springfield to meet Greater Springfield's current healthcare needs, while ensuring it's future-proofed to cater for growing demand.

"Our investment in health is about ensuring people across the State can access the care they need, when they need it, close to home," the Treasurer said. Mater Hospital Springfield General Manager Suzanne Hawksley said the announcement came at an exciting time for the facility.

"Mater Hospital Springfield's Emergency Department, outpatient lounge, and foyer are all approaching final fit-out, and it was fantastic to update the Premier on progress to date," Ms Hawksley said.



### Springfield doctor urges early screening

Springfield Gastroenterologist Dr Sylvia Vigh is urging Greater Springfield residents to complete their bowel cancer screening tests, with a rising trend of people under 50 being diagnosedwith the disease.

More than six million people aged over 45 are sent free bowel cancer screening tests each year in Australia, but a report by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare reveals that more than half fail to return their testing kit samples.

Dr Vigh said there is no doubt the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program saves lives.

"By the time people have bowel cancer symptoms like blood in their stool, stomach pain, fatigue, weight loss or changes in their bowel movements, it normally means the cancer has progressed," Dr Vigh said.

"Around 90 percent of stage one bowel cancers can be successfully treated if found early, so it's really important for people to do these tests and if they are positive, they should get a colonoscopy, as soon as possible."

Charlotte Hassing, 48, from New Beith said her only noticeable symptom was 'fatique'.

"The test came back positive, showing there was blood in my stool that wasn't visible to the naked eye. It surprised me, but I still didn't think anything major was wrong," she said.

"I am now receiving immunotherapy treatment every three weeks until the end of the year, and I may also need surgery to remove about 20 centimetres of my bowel".

Australia has the highest rate of bowel cancer in the world in people under 50, which now account for around one in nine cases being diagnosed.

"Don't wait, do the test and opt in as soon as you can, because it could save your life," said Ms Hassing.

Serves: 4
Preparation:
10 minutes

Cooking: 60 minutes

#### **Ingredients:**

1 medium-sized pumpkin

2 tablespoons unsalted butter

2-4 garlic cloves (depending on your preference)

3 cups of stock (chicken or vegetable) or bone broth

1 brown onion

½ cup coconut milk Sourdough bread

## Optional depending on preferences:

1 red capsicum 1 chilli, finely diced

Shaved parmesan

#### Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C.
- 2. Roughly chop pumpkin, onion and capsicum place the pumpkin and garlic cloves in a baking dish, drizzled with olive oil and flaked salt, and bake for 20 minutes, before adding the capsicum and chilli for a further 20 minutes.
- **3.** When the vegetables have five minutes left in the oven, bring a pot to medium heat, adding butter, and fry off onion until it begins to caramelise.
- **4.** Once onion is caramelised, add roasted vegetables and stock or broth. Bring to a boil and then simmer, gently pressing the vegetables with a wooden spoon to begin breaking them apart.
- **5.** Let the mixture cool a little, and then add to a food processor and blend to your desired consistency. Add your choice of herbs, spices, salt and pepper to taste.
- **6.** If making croutons, break sourdough into bite-sized chunks. Toss in a bowl with flaked salt, rosemary and a dash of oil. Bake in the oven until golden brown.

#### Serving suggestion:

Lightly grill slices of sourdough with shaved parmesan on top until parmesan begins to melt and crisp up on the bread. For added protein, fry diced bacon and either use as a topping or mix through after your soup is blended.
